
Celebrating our incredible volunteers

Tribute to Professor Douglas Chamberlain

It was with sadness that we heard of the passing of renowned cardiologist and highly-respected associate of SECAmb, Professor Douglas Chamberlain in May.

Douglas's tireless working with the ambulance service starting in the 1970s, led to the birth of the UK paramedic profession in Brighton, as the first 'ambulance men', who had been selected for addition training by him, began to respond to patients equipped with the first ambulance defibrillators.

Newborn baby reunites with ambulance team

A newborn baby boy, who went to cardiac arrest while being delivered, was introduced to the team who saved his life.

Kent parents, Charlotte and Matt, very proudly showed off their four-month-old son, George, as they thanked their son's lifesavers at an emotional reunion at Dartford Ambulance Station.

The family got to meet some of the team who helped when George went into cardiac arrest having been starved of oxygen as a result of becoming stuck in the birthing canal.

Response time target exceeded

In April we welcomed latest figures which show we consistently exceeded the response time target to respond to some of our most seriously ill and injured patients.

We were one of only a small number of ambulance trusts to exceed the Category 2 call performance target across the whole 12-months period of 1 April 2024 – 31 March 2025, with a yearly average response time of 28 minutes and 49 seconds, despite a close to 40,000 increase in 999 calls on the previous year.

The category includes calls to suspected stroke and heart attack patients and is where some two-thirds of our calls fall. As part of national improvement plans, ambulance services are currently commissioned to respond to Category 2 calls in an average of less than 30 minutes.

New easy read strategy launches to ensure every voice is heard

SECAmb among top performing trusts for flu vaccination uptake

We're pleased to be leading the way for NHS flu vaccination rates among frontline staff with a 73.7 per cent uptake – one of the highest rates recorded nationally.

Despite a decline in vaccination rates among frontline health care workers seen over the past few years, SECAmb recorded a remarkable uptake among frontline

and patient facing staff in 2025.

Nationally, the combined total for frontline health care workers for NHS trusts and GP practices was recorded as 37.8 per cent, pushing SECAmb to one of the top trusts for vaccination uptake in 2025.

Record survey response - morale up and improvements in all areas

Earlier this year, our results in the latest annual NHS Staff Survey revealed an increase in staff morale and continued year-on-year improvements across all key themes covered.

We were pleased that a record number of colleagues (3,268), 67 per cent of staff, completed the survey – the highest return rate ever recorded by the Trust.

The survey, which shows SECAmb as performing above the ambulance sector average in every area, was open to staff to complete anonymously in October and November last year.

Help Us Help You this summer...



Our top tips for staying safe and cool in the sun

- Stay in the shade or indoors
- Use sunscreen and cover up
- Increase your fluid intake
- Keep your home cool
- Look out for vulnerable family and friends
- Protect children. Keep a close eye on young children, who need plenty of fluids
- Act safely around water and follow lifeguard advice
- Be sensible with alcohol

Remember, heat stroke can kill. It can develop very suddenly and rapidly lead to unconsciousness. If you suspect someone is suffering from heat stroke call 999 immediately.

While waiting for the ambulance you should listen carefully to the call handler and follow the instructions given to you. The following can also help someone suffering from heat stroke:

- If possible, move the person somewhere cooler
- Increase ventilation by opening windows or using a fan
- Cool the patient down as quickly as possible by loosening their clothes, sprinkling them with cold water or wrapping them in a damp sheet
- If they are conscious, give them water or fruit juice to drink
- Do not give them aspirin or paracetamol
