I am writing in response to your enquiry under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA) reference FOI/15/12/25.

You requested the following information:

Under the Freedom of Information Act 2000, please can you provide me with:

1) The annual number of incidents an ambulance was called out to prisons or youth detention centres within the service's catchment area, broken down per institution, per year for each of the last 5 calendar years, including 2015.

Please see the table below which shows the emergency responses made to the prisons and youth detention centres in our area in the last five financial years. This data has been located by using the postcode as shown in the table.

2) The monthly number of incidents an ambulance was called out to at prisons and youth detention centres within the force's catchment area, broken down per institution, per type of callout, per month, for the calendar year of 2015.

To clarify, 'types of callouts' refer to the original reason for the ambulance being called, e.g. drug overdose, even if the description provided at the time was not borne out by the reality at the scene itself.

Please see the attached spreadsheet titled' Prison Responses 2015'. Each prison is shown on a separate tab together with the nature of the problem as determined by our call takers whilst triaging the 999 call. There is no tab for Blantyre as the prison was not open during 2015.

On your spreadsheet you refer to responses to prisons where legal highs (new psychoactive substances) may be the reason for the attendance. In connection with the question please see the table below which shows the number of responses made where during the 999 call, the caller has mentioned 'legal high' or 'spice' and the call taker has logged the phrase 'legal high' or 'spice' in the free text details of the call. This table contains information relating to the period from 1st January 2015 to 31st December 2015

I would like to stress that all of the figures provided in the table and on the spreadsheet are based on the information provided by the caller which may prove different to what our crews find when they reach the patient, therefore the detail given by the caller may not always be accurate.
